David has worked for seed companies for much of his career. He is an advocate of quality certified seed and supports the efforts of plant breeders bringing new genetics to farming. He also sees the benefit of farmers having the opportunity to multiply quality seed through the farm saved seed process.

"Having the flexibility to enable farmers to save seed is an excellent buffer to cope with the prospect of not having enough certified seed. However, certified seed is the only way to get new varieties and the only way to secure quality seed for the future. It reduces the likelihood of diseases and improves the prospect of higher yields," he says.

Seed represents the start of the crop and the day of drilling is the most important. In order for a crop to realise its full potential farmers and growers need to be using the purist and most productive seeds available.

"Farmers should aim to use the best quality seed which is underpinned by the certification process. As a tradable commodity the purity and quality of certified seed is ensured. Field and lab inspections offer the attention of detail needed to regulate the system, and seed treatments makes sure that there are low levels of disease."

Seed treatments are the most targeted way of controlling


THE IMPORTANCE OF GOOD SEED

Using quality seed is the foundation of farming. Plant breeders are continually developing new genetics to help crops be more resistant to disease and more resilient in our changing climate. Using certified seed offers farmers and growers greater confidence. However, farm saved seed is also important to maintain the quantity of seed needed to meet crop demand.

In the UK we have an excellent system for royalty capture. Our breeders are able to use the royalties to fund further development which helps to introduce new genetics. Our farmers have the opportunity to save and reuse the best seed which offers cost savings. BSPB is here to help both breeders and farmers to work together.

Our goal is to promote quality seed which produces the best crops and helps secure the sustainability of UK agriculture. diseases like smut and bunt. Today's seed treatments are very well regulated to minimise risk to nontarget species and the environment.

"We have an excellent system that keeps seed-borne diseases at very low levels. Laboratory testing is increasingly being used to establish disease levels to decide whether to



treat for disease or not. This is particularly evident in farm-saved seed but even here seed treatments continue to be widely used to build yield by stimulating root and shoot growth or providing early crop nutrition."
